The Question for Tonight:

How do we know that the Gospels were transmitted to us from the originals with reasonable accuracy?

(The problem of the telephone game.)

Do We Have the Originals?

We do not have the originals. We do not, as far as anyone knows, have copies of the copies of the original.

What Happened to the Originals?

- They were current so they didn't have any apologetic value.
- They were immediately copied and copied and copied for use in ministry.
- They were constantly in use in the missionary enterprise.
- They largely circulated in areas that were not conducive to the preservation of ancient writing materials.

Number of NT Witnesses:

There are ~6,100 manuscripts of the Greek New Testament in existence today, in whole or in part, that serve to corroborate the accuracy of the transmission of the New Testament. The earliest of these date to within forty years (give or take) of the time of the writing of the New Testament.

Is that a lot?

Compare with other ancient sources:

- Homer's *Iliad*, 643 copies
- Junus Caesar's Gauce Wars, 10 copies of it, the earliest of which was made 1, years after it was written.
 Livy wrote 142 books of Roman history, of which a mere 35 survive in only 20 manuscripts, only one of which is as old as the 4th century.
 Tacitus' Histories and Annals, 2 copies (9th and 11th century)
 The History of Thucydides, 8 copies (10th century)
 The writings of Plato survive in 7 copies.
 Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, 80 mss.
 Beowulf, 1 copy • Julius Caesar's Gallic Wars, 10 copies of it, the earliest of which was made 1,000

The New Testament is the most well attested to document in the ancient world by far.

If you are willing to say, "You can't trust the New Testament because we don't have the original documents and because decades passed between the events and the earliest documents that wrote about them," then you have to admit you can't trust virtually any ancient document or historical account.

And no one is silly enough to say that!

How different are the manuscripts?

- 100% of the New Testament manuscripts agree in 90% of their texts.
- 95% of the New Testament manuscripts agree in 100% of their text.
- Two possible readings do not produce conjectural uncertainty.
- In every meaningful way, we have the "original" text of the New Testament.

What about all those errors?

- Obvious Mechanical (Nonsensical)
- Orthographic (Spelling)
- Minor (Non-Translatable) Various
 Major (Translatable) but Non-Viable Various
- Major (Translatable) and Viable Various
